

Proclamation

Whereas, the people of New York State share the vision of a better world for all humankind, built upon the ideals of love and respect for one another, and we are committed to ensuring the safety, sanctity, and integrity of life in our communities – with utter rejection of viciously expressed forms of hate and bigotry; and

Exercise, we likewise reaffirm our fundamental belief that all free and civilized societies cannot, must not, and will not tolerate any act of violence or hate-motivated crime committed against our fellow human beings, and we are dismayed and disgusted to see the growing number of anti-Semitic incidents and acts of violence – physical, verbal, and psychological – that are being directed against our state and nation's Jewish communities; and

Experses, today, October 27, 2019, marks one year since the horrific events at the Tree of Life synagogue in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, which tragically took the lives of eleven worshippers and injured seven more in the deadliest anti-Semitic attack in American history; and

##hereas, only months later, a second attack on worshipers occurred during the Jewish holiday of Passover at the Chabad of Poway synagogue in California, resulting in one fatality and three injuries; and

Exercise, the Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI) is our nation's leading crime investigation, assessment, and analysis authority, and its most recent data reflect a 37% increase in anti-Semitic hate crimes in the United States; the FBI's statistics indicate that, in 2019, Jewish people and institutions, both religious and communal, were the most frequently targeted group, accounting for almost 60% of all religious-based hate crime incidents; and

Epereas, America is built upon its immigrant communities and New York State's history is highlighted by the immigrant experience so well reflected in our diversity today, and we will always embrace people of all races, religions, nationalities, sexual orientations, socioeconomic backgrounds, and political viewpoints who strengthen our social and cultural fabric, and reinforce our foundation of freedom; and

Exercise, this common concern for our fellow man deepens the sense of community that brings us together as one family of humankind, and is found in those whose faith is strengthened by the personal losses they have endured; we join with our state and nation's Jewish communities to solemnly commemorate those lost on this day one year ago, and draw inspiration from their strength and wisdom to speak out against anti-Semitic violence and, in doing so, foster greater respect for life and its sacredness for those generations to come;

Dow, Therefore, I, Andrew M. Cuomo, Governor of the State of New York, do hereby proclaim October 27, 2019 as

and on behalf of the people of New York State, reaffirm our commitment to combating all forms of hatred and anti-Semitism, with our lasting pledge to ensure the safety and dignity of our residents and communities.
